## **Mobile clinic for western Nepal**

**Bajura, the isolated district in the far west of the himalayan state, is considered the last wagon of the nepalese train. Kolti, a tiny airstrip in the south can only be reached at odd times in a 12-seat airplane. It is the only connection to other parts of the country. The rest of the way is a walking trail. About two dozen villages scattered on an area of more than 2000 square kilometers, separated from each other by over 4000 meter high passes and deeply indented river valleys. Also separated from the 7000 meter high Saipal, which lies in the north, the highest mountain of western Nepal.**

**For years, this isolated region was a retreat for the militant Maoists, who led a bitter Guerilla war against the central government in Kathmandu. They recruited young men from villages for their armed struggle, if necessary by force, and promised the inhabitants everything they wished for. So, the theory was, if this corrupt government is once eliminated, it would turn out for the better for these villages.**



**Today the Maoists are situated in the government of Nepal, but nothing has changed up-to-now. There are no schools or doctors, no medical care. People are still helplessly exposed to diseases. The bitter truth is: governments come and go, but corruption remains.**

**The first step in 2018 for a medical care in this district, should be in the form of a mobile team of doctors and nurses. In addition to medical care, it is important to find a suitable location for the permanent presence of a nepalese physician and nurse and to construct a necessary infrastructure.**
